Helena Vietnam veteran and Presidential Citizens Medal recipient dies at age 79

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There's a statue of three uniformed women and a wounded man in Washington, D.C.

One nurse cradles the wounded soldier, a hand clasped over his injury and a solemn look on her face. Another looks to the sky, one palm on the first nurse's arm as she stands guard. A third kneels with a helmet in her hand. During the Vietnam Women's Memorial location dedication, the statue's main advocate, Diane Carlson Evans, stood humbly in the face of her many accolades, retired Army Col. Ray Read remembered. It was where they first met.

Hailing from Buffalo, Minnesota, but making Helena her latest home, Carlson Evans was a smart, kind-hearted woman who sought to care for the needy, whether it was on the front lines or back home where they served American Legion Post 2 together, Read said.

It had taken years for that statue to be completed, first approved by

Congress in 1988 and completed in 1993, but it was far from the end of Carlson Evans' advocacy, Read said. She'd take on veteran homelessness and healthcare, and she seemed tireless and focused through it all, he noticed.

"Her voice is strong," Read said.

Diane Carlson Evans, an Army nurse and lifelong veteran advocate,

died May 20 at 79 years old after battling cancer.

Carlson Evans began her service in the Army in 1968, tending to the wounded at the 71st Evacuation Hospital in Pleiku, Vietnam, and the 36th Evacuation Hospital's burn unit in Vung Tau. Women

Bodnar campaign submits 30K signatures

Independent candidate needed 13,000 to get on ballot, leads fundraising

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While Republicans and Democrats vying for Montana's open U.S. Senate seat are one week out from their primaries, Seth Bodnar, who left the top post at University of Montana to run for the office as an independent, says his campaign has gathered more than twice the signatures needed for his unconventional candidacy.

The Bodnar campaign announced Tuesday it had collected nearly 30,000 signatures from Montanans. The campaign needs more than 13,000 signatures to be approved by the Montana Secretary of State to get onto the November ballot without a party label. Tuesday was the deadline to submit signatures to county election administrators.

"While DC Insiders tried to rig this election in March by installing a handpicked candidate who will do their bidding, our campaign has spent months building a political movement of Montanans who want the chance to send leaders to Washington who will always put Montana First," Bodnar said in a statement. "I will never pay allegiance to Party bosses or political elites, and I will work every day until Election Day to earn the vote of every Montanan."

State law allows independent candidates to avoid the primary gauntlet and instead demonstrate buy-in from voters by collecting a certain number of signatures, a threshold that varies depending on the office sought.

The campaign first submits the petitions to county election officers, who approve or reject signatures from local residents before passing the batch of approved signatures to the secretary of state for another round of verification. Only after Montana's top election administrator has signed off on the total does an independent candidate get on the ballot.

By Tuesday afternoon, county election officials throughout the state had approved 11,000 signatures and rejected 3,984 of those that had been submitted, according to information provided by the secretary of state's office. County administrators have until June 1 to evaluate and submit signatures to the secretary of state for certification.

Bodnar's campaign said it submitted signatures from residents in 52 of Montana's 56 counties.

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Congress considers cattle for wildfire suppression

New federal grazing policy proposals would open up millions of acres to grazing

More than 1,000 cows and sheep died when the 2024 Remington fire scorched almost 200,000 acres in south-central Montana. If proposed federal grazing policies become law, those livestock could be considered firefighters instead of fire victims.

Under federal proposals floated by both Congress and cabinet agencies this spring, livestock could become major players in wildfire suppression efforts by literally eating the fuel before it burns. However, current research indicates the results could vary widely depending on what landscape and climate are involved. And critics say the revised policies would

spread invasive species, hurt endangered ones and do nothing to stop wildfires.

Both Republicans and Democrats have pitched grazing-as-firefighting bills in the current congressional cycle, and the Trump administration has released new agency grazing policies listing fire suppression as a justification. But the debate rarely gets at a central question: Are firefighters asking for ranchers' help to reduce grass fires, or are ranchers asking for more grass by claiming that grazing could be a wildfire suppression tool? At stake are millions of acres of public grassland and forest that currently have little or no livestock accessibility.

"From a livestock producer standpoint, we've been having these conversations for many years about bringing cattle grazing into the toolbox for fire mitigation and management," said Raylee Honeycutt, executive vice president of the Montana

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ZORTMAN-LANDUSKY GOLD MINE

Montana moves to settle mining violations at gold mine for half original fine

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Montana regulators are proposing to settle their allegations of recent illegal mining activities at the former Zortman-Landusky gold mine by requiring a payment of less than half the original fine.

The consent decree would require a \$200,000 settlement to the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ), but no admission of guilt. It was immediately opposed by the adjacent Fort Belknap Indian Community, which has for decades been burdened by extensive water pollution from the shuttered mining complex.

The DEQ in July 2022 issued a fine of more than \$500,000 to Luke Ployhar, Owen Voigt and their companies for what it then called a “violation of major gravity that has compromised reclamation work at the site and represents a risk of acid rock drainage.” Satellite images showed unpermitted exploration activity had previously occurred, the DEQ alleged.

Ployhar, Voigt and their companies have denied wrongdoing. They were ordered in 2022 to halt exploration and mining activities until they secured needed exploration permits. They had previously applied for and received a permit, but it was blocked by a state court after being challenged by the tribes and other groups.

Reached Tuesday, both referred questions about their work and the case to a statement from Ployhar, who purchased the property more than 25 years ago after the original mine closed. It notes they continue to deny wrongdoing and “we firmly believe that our conduct — in all respects — complied with applicable law.”

“Along with Montana DEQ, we jointly proposed this settlement to avoid further costly litigation and to bring resolution to the parties involved,” continued the statement, in part.

Filed May 22 in Phillips County District Court, the proposed consent decree also requires the men to withdraw their exploratory mining permit, but allows them to reapply for a new one.

Fort Belknap Indian Community President Randall Werk Sr. said the settlement fails to address “long-term impacts of the environmental issues associated with the Zortman-Landusky site.”

“This area lies within our ancestral homelands, and we have a responsibility to protect our lands, waters, cultural resources and future generations,” Werk wrote in a statement Tuesday. “Significant environmental concerns remain unresolved, water treatment continues indefinitely and important questions regarding the full scope of environmental damages have not yet been fully evaluated. We believe additional accountability, environmental review and meaningful tribal involvement are necessary before this matter is resolved.”

Earthjustice, which is representing the tribes in the case, stated they plan to file their opposition to the consent decree.

A DEQ spokesperson said the agency does not comment on ongoing litigation.

The \$200,000 settlement would be used for remediation and water treatment at the mine site, under the consent decree.

The state’s account to pay the Zortman mine’s cleanup costs is on the verge of running out, DEQ Director Sonja Nowakowski told lawmakers last August. But DEQ spokesperson Madison McGeffers wrote in an email Tuesday that the dire account balance was incorrect.

An accounting error failed to include money from metal mine taxes that had not been transferred to the cleanup account, McGeffers wrote. The balance in that account currently stands at \$7.6 million.

In August, Nowakowski also said her agency had requested financial help from the federal Bureau of Land Management, which already pays about half of the annual \$3 million cost of operating the site’s six water treatment systems. The federal agency has not formally responded to that letter, according to the DEQ.

In a state pockmarked with the toxic scars of past mining practices, the former Zortman-Landusky mine has become something of a posterchild for the far-reaching impacts of mining practices. For about two decades, the open-pit mine extensively used arsenic heap-leaching, a once-common gold mining process that has since been banned in Montana by popular referendum.

By the time the mine’s owner, Pegasus Gold, closed the mine and filed for bankruptcy in 1998, its operations had extensively degraded the 1,200-acre mine site at the foot of the Little Rockies mountain range. Acid mine drainage and heavy metal contamination have heavily polluted surface and groundwater in the area.

It’s also among a number of Montana’s mining sites that may never be fully remediated. Montana requires mining companies to pay a bond on par with the estimated costs of cleanup, an attempt to guarantee taxpayers don’t get stuck with the bill.

But due to Pegasus’s bankruptcy and the state drastically underestimating the bond needed for cleanup, Nowakowski said taxpayers have, to date, spent more than \$63 million on cleanup at the Zortman site since 1999. Federal taxpayers have covered \$20 million of that total, while state taxpayers have spent \$39 million.

The company’s failure to clean up its mess resulted in it and its executives being banned from working in Montana, under the state’s “bad actor” mining law. Since then, Montana has also updated its bonding laws in an attempt to more accurately forecast the costs of mine reclamation.

didn’t need to serve, she’d say to Congress during her push for the memorial, but she volunteered “believing we belonged with our brothers-in-arms.”

When she returned to the United States, she struggled with the things she had seen.

Much of her life afterward was defined by a fierce determination to aid veterans and recognize the women of war who were too often overlooked, including the Red Cross volunteers, administrators and photographers.

“How proud I was of those many women I served with!” Carlson Evans wrote in a message from the Vietnam Women’s War Memorial Foundation, titled “Dare To Dream.” “Yet, as the nation dedicated memorials to Vietnam veterans across the country, very few recognized the vast and essential role of women. I knew that the nation could not forget them and began to dream of adding a statue portraying women’s strength, compassion, courage, and service on the hallowed ground of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. Many others agreed, and together we founded the Vietnam Women’s Memorial Project in 1984.”

“Because of Diane, countless women veterans finally received the recognition they so deeply deserved and saw themselves reflected in our Nation’s history for the very first time,” nonprofit Military Women’s Memorial wrote on social media. “It is our privilege to preserve and share Diane’s story of service, ensuring future generations will know and remember her story, her courage, and her unwavering dedication to those who served our Nation.”

Her service would be applauded on a national stage, even reaching the Oval Office when she was awarded the Presidential Citizens Medal on Jan. 2, 2025, by then-President Joe Biden.

“Her duty and devotion embody the very best of who we are as Americans,” the White House said in a news release at the time.

“Iknew I was nominated for the award, but I didn’t think I would get it,” Carlson Evans told the Independent Record shortly after. “I was overwhelmed.”

After her service, Carlson Evans made the Queen City her home with her husband, Mike Evans, a doctor she’d met and fallen in love with at Brooke Army Medical Center at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, where they both once worked. She and Mike have been “part of Helena for years,” Read said.

On Feb. 24, 2025, the Helena City Commission celebrated Diane Carlson Evans Day in her honor, packing the Commission chambers with flower-bearing attendees.

“On behalf of my sister veterans,” Carlson Evans told commissioners after she accepted the award. “It’s they who deserve the recognition and honor.”

Cmdr. Kenneth Rosenbaum, who headed American Legion Post 2 and was a fellow Vietnam War veteran, said it made him emotional when Carlson Evans was celebrated.

It’s hard to forget the brutal injuries his comrades suffered, he said. In those same memories, he

remembered the nurses fighting to keep them alive.

“It’s like visiting a cemetery,” he said after the city’s celebration.

“Not the grief, but the memories. Seeing Diane honored today ... she deserves it. This is a day to celebrate her and everyone she represents.”

Beyond her service, Carlson Evans is remembered by her homemade jam and love for her family, her obituary says. A perfect day for her, so she said, was spent outdoors by a lake, where loons called and the kids played.

Carlson Evans is preceded in death by grandson Wyatt Michael

Evans; parents Newell and Dorothy Carlson; and brothers Chester, Ronald and Ward Carlson. She is survived by her husband Mike; children Guy, Luke, Carrie and Jon-Erik; grandchildren Azaria, Maisie, Kacie, Kai-Biko, Revy and Nora; her brother, Maynard Carlson; and sister, Nola Nilsson.

In lieu of flowers, her family requested mourners thank a veteran for their service and invite them to share their story, or to donate to an organization supporting community veterans.
